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Chapter 1 Introduction and System Description

McLane Sediment Trap

The McLane Sediment Trap is a time-series sampler that uses 21 or 13 individual sample bottles of 250mL or 500mL to collect the flux of settling particles in-situ. Several Sediment Trap models are available to fit different sampling needs.

Sediment Trap Models

Available Sediment Trap models are listed below.

Model	Description
Mark 78H-21	Collects 21 individual samples in 250mL or 500mL bottles (0.5 m ² collection area).
Mark 78HW-13	Collects 13 individual samples in 250mL or 500mL wider bottles (0.5 m² collection area).
Mark 8	Collects 13 individual samples in 250mL or 500mL bottles. This Sediment Trap has a smaller cone and lighter weight than the Mark 78H-21 Sediment Trap series (0.25 m² collection area).



Sediment Trap Options

Optional Sediment Trap features include:

- Optional Tilt, Temperature and/or Depth: Sediment Traps with CF2 electronics have an option to install a tilt sensor (tilt is included with Gen3 electronics). Optional sensors can be installed to record temperature and depth (pressure) data.
- Optional High Pressure Penetrators: Sediment Traps deployed at depths from 7,000 to 10,000 m, require high pressure penetrators on the controller COM port and motor connector.



Examples in this User Manual use the Standard Mark 7H-21 Sediment Trap with CF2 electronics unless otherwise specified.

Using this Manual



This User Manual describes the operation of Sediment Traps that use CF2 electronics. If you are using a Sediment Trap with new Gen3 electronics, refer to the Sediment Trap and McLanePro user manual on our website https://mclanelabs.com/sediment-traps/sediment-trap-manuals/. See "Electronics Components" in this chapter to confirm whether your controller has CF2 or Gen3 electronics.

This User Manual provides:


- Descriptions and specifications of mechanical and electrical parts of the system.
- Operating instructions.
- Suggested maintenance procedures to extend sampler performance.

This user manual is designed to provide support from the first steps of powering on and communicating with the instrument, to the final steps of recovering data from a recently deployed system, and storing the instrument. Sampler operators and technicians should read this manual and keep a copy as a reference.

Mechanical Components

Mechanical components of the Sediment Trap include the frame, cone, baffle, controller housing, o-rings, and gear plate assembly. These are described in the section that follows.




Figure 1-2: Mark 78H-21 Sediment Trap – Full View

<u>Frame</u>

The Sediment Trap frame is a Grade 2 titanium frame designed to protect the controller electronics and rotator.



<u>Cone</u>

The cone collects settling particles from the wide opening at the top of the Sediment Trap and deposits them into individual sample bottles on a user-defined schedule. The collection area is:

- Mark 78H 0.5m²
- Mark8 0.25m2




Figure 1-3: Cone and Sample Bottle Side View

Honeycomb Baffle

A honeycomb baffle tops a short polyethylene mounting cylinder at the top of the Sediment Trap cone. This baffle prevents large objects and marine life from clogging the sampler because each baffle cell is more narrow than the small aperture at the bottom of the cone.

Controller Housing

The standard Titanium controller housing is pressure resistant to 7,000 meters. A deep controller housing option is rated to 10,000 meters. The controller housing holds the battery pack for 14 'C' cell alkaline batteries, and the electronics assembly. Two rubber-insulated, 316 stainless steel U-bolts fasten the housing to the frame. The controller can be opened while attached to the frame.

Top and Bottom End Caps

Top and bottom end caps seal the controller housing from water intrusion with a face o-ring seal and a radial o-ring seal (with a backup ring).

O-Rings

O-rings must be installed properly and kept in place at all times. Each set includes three o-rings (200-0071, 200-0072, 200-0073). See Chapter 6, 'Maintenance and Storage' for details on cleaning o-rings and proper positioning when inserting the end cap into the controller housing.

McLane uses o-rings that meet MIL-G 21569 Class 1. Backup rings are Buna-N, Parker material NO300 or equal.




Figure 1-6: Sediment Trap O-Ring Installation - Correct Placement is Critical



O-ring maintenance and correct placement is critical to prevent water intrusion. Incorrect o-ring placement results in cracks or splits that could affect the o-ring seal and cause water damage to the controller. Water damage from incorrectly placed or maintained o-rings can void the sampler warranty.

End Cap Bulkhead Connectors

<u>Do not overtighten</u> the end cap bolts. The Toolkit includes spare hardware, or contact mclane@mclanelabs.com.






Figure 1-7: Standard Titanium Controller Housing End Cap and Bulkhead Connectors




Figure 1-9: Gear Ring Alignment Hole and Sample Bottle Hole #1

Figure 1-9 shows the Deep Sediment Trap controller housing end cap and bulkhead connectors.



Optional High Pressure Penetrators

Sediment Traps deployed at depths from 7,000 m to 10,000 m, require high pressure penetrators on the controller COM port and motor connector. Sediment Traps with the deep option do not have a pressure relief valve installed. Appendix E 'Deep Sediment Trap Connectors' provides more details.

Gear Plate Assembly

The gear plate assembly attaches to the top fixed plate with seven (7) bolts. On the gear plate assembly, four (4) bolts with plastic washers attach the gear ring to the bottom fixed plate. An unthreaded alignment hole, referred to as Port 'Zero' (0) aligns the rotator assembly when the Trap is deployed to protect the integrity of the adjacent sealed bottles and prevent sample contamination. The first sample bottle hole is labeled '1'.

Plastic Ball Bearings

The inside of the Gear Plate Assembly is filled with plastic ball bearings.




Figure 1-10: Bottom Fixed Plate and Gear Ring

<u>Variseals®</u>

The upper openings of the sample bottle holes are fitted with Teflon spring-loaded Variseal[®] gaskets to seal out ambient water and protect the samples from contamination. Do not apply grease or lubricant to the gear ring, bottom fixed plate, or Variseals[®]. These gaskets are visible when the gear plate assembly is detached from the top plate. A continuous Hastelloy circular spring inside the gasket expands the upper and lower gasket halves.

The plastic ball bearings and Variseals® in the gear plate assembly are highly durable and withstand multiple years of deployment activity without replacement.



Drive Motor

The drive motor assembly contains the following:

- A high-torque electronic stepping motor
- A reducing gear train
- A microswitch/cam device
- A titanium main drive shaft

The motor's main drive shaft generates 30 kg/cm torque at the spur gear. A switch and cam assembly in the stepper motor confirms proper alignment of each bottle. The firmware also records the time and fill position when each bottle advances.

The motor housing interior is filled with 450 ml of silicone fluid (a quad-ring around the main drive shaft securely separates the silicone fluid from seawater). A bladder of flexible, impermeable Nitrile allows compression of the silicone fluid to compensate for external static pressure. All interior motor housing shafts are supported by high precision ball bearings.




Figure 1-14: Drive Motor Housing

Sediment Trap Toolkit

Each Sediment Trap comes with a toolkit that contains tools, materials, and devices to use the Sediment Trap. The toolkit and contents are referred to throughout this User Manual, and should remain with the instrument at all times.

Serial Number

The Sediment Trap cross channel support contains the instrument serial number printed on a label. The controller housing end cap and System Menu also display the serial number.

Electronics Components

This User Manual describes Sediment Traps with the previous generation CF2 electronics. New Sediment Traps operate using McLane Gen3 electronics. STOP reading this User Manual and refer to the Sediment Trap and McLanePro user manual on our website https://mclanelabs.com/sediment-traps/sediment-trap-manuals/ if your Sediment Trap has Gen3 electronics.

Identifying your Controller Type

The Communication bulkhead connector and/or cable will identify whether your instrument has Gen3 or CF2 electronics. The Gen3 communication cable has a USB connector and 6-pin MCBH bulkhead. The CF2 communication cable has a DB-9 connector and a 5-pin MCBH bulkhead.

The communication cables are <u>not</u> interchangeable between Gen3 and CF2 electronics.






Figure 1-18: Gen3 (6-pin MCBH Connector) and CF2 (5-pin MCBH Connector)



McLane electronics are designed to use minimal power while achieving the longest possible deployment durations. Instrument electronics spend most of their time in low power sleep mode. In this suspended state, the system consumes very little power (micro-amps) while keeping track of time to start and complete scheduled events.

Main Battery

The Sediment Trap battery holder holds user replaceable drop-in alkaline 'C' cell batteries. Be sure to install the batteries with the correct orientation in the holder terminals. An instructional video showing drop-in battery replacement is shown on the Sediment Trap video pages at www.mclanelabs.com.

The batteries are not installed in a new Sediment Trap. However they are included either in the toolkit or in the shipping crate.

Always take standard electrostatic discharge (ESD) precautions when handling the electronics.

Chapter 2 Getting Started

The Sediment Trap toolkit includes a COM cable for connecting the sampler to a host computer. You must also install the McLaneTerm terminal emulation program on your computer.

Topics Covered:

- Connecting to a computer.
- Installing and configuring terminal emulation software on a computer.
- Powering up a McLane Sampler.
- Communicating with a McLane Sampler.

Connecting the Sampler to a Computer

Communicating with your instrument requires connecting the communications cable to a computer running terminal emulation, and configuring the terminal emulation software.

Connecting a Computer

Connect to the instrument by plugging the communications cable from the communications bulkhead on the end cap to a computer RS-232 serial port (the toolkit includes a USB to RS-232 adapter for computers without the built-in RS-232 port). Plug the adapter into the USB port, wait for the drivers to install, and then check the computer's Device Manager for the new USB Serial Port. Windows typically downloads and installs the necessary drivers automatically when the USB to RS-232 adapter is plugged into a USB port.

Troubleshooting the USB Adaptor

The USB adaptor has LED indicator lights for transmitting and receiving data. Typing any key in McLaneTerm terminal emulation should be indicated by the LED. If no LED light flashes on keystrokes, you may have selected the incorrect COM Port.

Installing McLaneTerm

McLaneTerm is a terminal emulator. This software and the User Manual can also be downloaded at our website www.mclanelabs.com.

Follow the steps in the McLaneTerm User Manual to install and configure this terminal emulation software. When communication with your McLane instrument is established, Proceed to the section that follows next in this User Manual "Powering up the Sampler".



McLaneTerm system requirements: Windows® 7 or higher.

Powering up the Sampler

Connecting the battery is the only way to power on the sampler electronics. This step requires opening the controller housing. Be sure to perform this procedure in a dry area and familiarize yourself with steps for using the Pressure Relief Valve.



Opening the Controller Housing

Attention and care should be taken in maintaining, operating, and opening the pressure housing. All samplers shipped after summer 2015 have a pressure relief valve (PRV) on the controller housing. This valve releases automatically at a pressure differential greater than 10psi. The PRV style may have a center hole and release tool, or the style may have a flat relief valve that must be manually pulled out.



Observe safety precautions including removing personnel and objects from the path of the end-cap when removing the controller housing.







Figure 2-2: Releasing Pressure Relief Valve (Flat Style)






Figure 2-3: Releasing Pressure Relief Valve (Style with Release Tool)

- 1. Disconnect the cables from the end cap (if connected).
- 2. Slowly pull on the pressure relief valve to release any vacuum or built up pressure in the housing.
- 3. Loosen each end cap bolt a few turns at a time in a star pattern.
- 4. If the end cap separates from the housing as you loosen the bolts, this could indicate a possible pressure buildup inside of the housing. Stop loosening bolts and continue to gently pull on the pressure relief valve.
- 5. Remove and place the end cap hardware somewhere safe. Typically, plastic inserts have a snug fit and will remain in the end cap.
- 6. Grasp the end cap lip with fingertips and pull the end cap out of the housing (Figure 2-3). The end cap to housing seal is tight and sometimes difficult to open. Do not use a tool to pull open the housing. The end cap o-rings can be damaged if objects are used to separate the end cap from the housing.






Figure 2-4: Separating the Housing and End Cap

Connecting the Batteries

Locate the battery conductors. The black two pin MTE connector will only fit into one connector on the electronics stack. Find the two pin female connector that mates with the battery connector on the Aux / Stepper board and plug in the batteries.




Figure 2-5: Connecting the Battery

Chapter 3 User Interface

This chapter introduces the user interface including the Main and Configuration Menus, and explores some basic functions of the Sediment Trap menu-driven user interface. See Chapter 2 for information about connecting the Sediment Trap to a computer and powering on the system. Topics covered in this chapter include:

- Main and configuration Menus
- Instrument Settings (time, diagnostics, manual operations, sleep)
- Deployment Settings (create schedule, deploy Sediment Trap)

Section 3.1 Main and Configuration Menus

Main Menu

The Main Menu is the Sediment Trap home screen. All operations end up back at the Main Menu when completed. The Main Menu automatically displays after system initialization.




Figure 3.1-1: Sediment Trap Main Menu

• Configuration String: The configuration string indicates the current instrument configuration. The configuration string in Figure 3.1-1 indicates the Sediment Trap is a 13cup model with the Tilt and RBR Pressure and Temperature sensors.



- **Firmware Version**: The currently running firmware version is displayed on the top right corner of the Main Menu.
- **Serial Number**: The McLane Serial Number can be found on the Main Menu and should be included in all system inquiries to McLane Research Labs.

Configuration Menu

The Configuration Menu allows the user to program which components are installed on the system. McLane properly configures the instrument before shipping. You may need to reconfigure the system if mechanical components are added or the system firmware is updated.

To configure the Sediment Trap:

- 1. Enter "C" at the Main Menu.
- 2. When asked for a password, enter "CON".
- 3. Use menu option A to select the system model (21 cup or 13 cup).



The Number of Cups setting must match the installed Sediment Trap rotator. Contact mclane@mclanelabs.com with questions about your configuration.

- 4. Use through <G> to select options that are installed on the Sediment Trap.
- 5. Save and exit using Configuration Menu option <X>.



Optional Tilt, Pressure and Temperature Sensors

These options are enabled on the Configuration Menu.

- Tilt is recorded with an additional electronics board installed on the Sediment Trap controller. Recording tilt data contributes to battery drain. Use the tilt sample interval to set tilt data collection frequency. A less frequently interval (such as only at sample event) will conserve the battery. Tilt data is stored in the non volatile memory file TILT.DAT. EEPROM volatile backup also copies every record from the tilt time history.
- Temperature and/or Depth recordings are available with RBR sensors. See Appendix B in this User Manual for detailed information about optional pressure and temperature sensors.

Section 3.2 Instrument Settings

<1> Set Time

The Set Time Menu allows you to program the system real time clock (RTC). McLane recommends setting the RTC during the power-up sequence. When the sampler is powered on, the clock defaults to January 1,1970, 00:00:00. The clock can be set to any date and time in the allowed range and the count will continue from the new value.

Older systems with a backup battery will retain the date and time as long as the backup batteries are installed and have an acceptable voltage. Systems without a backup battery will not keep time when the main battery pack is unplugged. To set the time:

- 1. Select the Set Time option.
- 2. Enter the date and time using the provided format.
- 3. Accept the changes to the system clock.

<2> Diagnostics

Diagnostics scrolls a system status display with date, time, battery voltage (in Vb), temperature (in °Celsius), and Rotator status. To exit Diagnostics and return to the Main Menu type *X* or [CTRL]-[C]. Toggle the scrolling on and off without exiting by pressing any other alphanumeric key.

- Diagnostics data printed to the screen can be paused and resumed by entering any key into McLaneTerm.
- Tilt magnitude (in degrees of tilt), also displays if the tilt option is installed and configured.
- Pressure and Temperature data also displays if the RBR pressure and/or temperature sensors are installed (see Appendix B for details about optional RBR sensors).
- Exit and return to the Main Menu by entering [CTRL]-[C].

Battery Warnings

- Low battery voltage triggers warning messages during the exit from the Diagnostics display. If the main battery falls below 18 V, a message displays suggesting battery replacement before deployment.
- If the main battery falls below 12 V, a message displays, the Diagnostic routine terminates, and the program returns to the Main Menu.
- If critically low battery voltage (under 12 V) is detected and a data file has not been offloaded, an additional warning displays before the system returns to the Main Menu.





Confirm that deployment data is offloaded and is accurate before disconnecting the battery. The firmware detects only the successful execution of the Offload Data option and not whether the data file was successfully logged by McLaneTerm. Any deployment data in RAM is lost if the battery is unplugged.

• Type [X] or [CTRL]-[C] to exit from Diagnostics and return to the Main Menu.

<3> Fill Containers

Fill Containers provides direct control of advancing the rotator for bench testing, system assessment, and deployment preparation.

<4> Sleep

Sleep suspends the Sediment Trap in Low power sleep mode to conserve battery power. When the sampler is not rotating to the next sample bottle, this mode automatically triggers after 20 minutes of inactivity.

Prior to Sleep mode, the current time will display. During Suspend mode, the system will wake every 20 minutes to check system status, display the time and then return to Suspend mode. Suspend mode automatically occurs after a sample is completed. To wake the system and return to the Main Menu, press [CTRL]-[C] three times (with one second pauses between each keystroke).



Section 3.3 Deployment Settings

The remaining Main Menu options are used to prepare and perform a deployment. These options are:

- Create Schedule: Defines the number of samples and frequency of rotation events. A maximum of 22 possible events (21 samples and the closing of the last sample) or 14 possible events (13 samples and the closing of the last sample) can be scheduled. The schedule re-displays for verification when <6> Deploy is selected.
- Deploy System: Checks EEPROM (a reboot is required if EEPROM has data, and a
 warning displays to offload data). Confirms rotator alignment, date and time, and
 displays the sample event schedule for confirmation or change. Displays a final
 sample parameter check with options to make changes. After the date, time and
 sampling parameters are confirmed, the final check is performed and a final prompt
 is displayed.
- Offload Data: Works with the "Capture to file" feature of McLaneTerm. After recovering the Sediment Trap, and re-establishing the communications link with the computer, select <7> Offload Data to capture data to a text file. Confirm that McLaneTerm "Capture to File" is ON during offload. Offload data before disconnecting the battery to prevent data loss.

Deployment Settings (create schedule, deploy system) are explained in the 'Programming a Deployment' section in Chapter 4 of this user manual. Offload Data options are explained in Chapter 5 of this user manual.



<8> Contacting McLane

This option displays McLane contact information and includes the software version and serial number of your instrument.

Chapter 4 Operations

This chapter describes the procedures involved in preparing the Sediment Trap for a deployment. Topics include:

- Preparing and attaching the sample bottles.
- Aligning the rotator to the open position.
- Filling the sample bottles.
- Programming deployment parameters.

Section 4.1 Deployment Preparation

Follow these preliminary steps to prepare the deployment.

- 1. Install batteries.




Figure 4.1-1: Correct Controller Housing Orientation

- 2. Close the controller housing with the orientation shown in Figure 4.1-1 (see Chapter 6 in this User Manual for instructions).

- 3. Confirm the motor cable is attached.
- 4. Remove the dummy plug.
- 5. Connect the communications cable.
- 6. Confirm the computer and the instrument are communicating (follow the steps in Chapter 2, 'Getting Started to establish communications if needed).



Section 4.2 Preparing and Attaching the Sample Bottles

Preparing and attaching the sample bottles includes filling each sample bottle approximately full with neutral water.

- 1. Follow the steps in Chapter 2, 'Getting Started with your McLane Sampler' to establish communications with the Sediment Trap.
- 2. Close and seal the controller housing (see Chapter 6 in this User Manual for instructions).
- 3. If using the Tilt sensor, see Section 4.5 'Orienting End Cap for Optional Tilt'. Otherwise, skip to Step 4.
- 4. Wash and rinse the sample bottles with neutral/distilled water.
- 5. Dry bottles thoroughly.



- 6. Slide one silicone o-ring onto each sample bottle.
- 7. Screw the sample bottles into the holes on the Gear Plate and hand-tighten. It is helpful to number bottles with their port number on the outside with a permanent marker.

Section 4.3 Aligning the Rotator to the Open Position

To position the rotator to the starting point, complete the following steps.

- 1. From the Main Menu, select <3> Fill Containers.
- 2. Advance the sample bottles until you reach the position with no bottle. This is the starting position for the deployment.

Section 4.4 Filling the Sample Bottles

- 1. Remove the rotator assembly fill plug (a 7/16" wrench is included in the toolkit).
- 2. From the Main Menu, select option <3> Fill Containers.
- 3. Fill the first sample bottle with neutral water.




Figure 4.4-1: Removing the Plug from the Fill Hole




Figure 4.4-2: Fill Containers

- 4. Repeat Step 2 for 21 (or 13) more times, moving the rotator around and filling the sample bottles full with neutral water.
- 5. Return the plug to the fill hole, using a 7/16" wrench to tighten.





Sample collection starts and ends on an open hole in the rotator (the 22nd or 14th sample event, depending on model). If not using all sample bottles, program the schedule to <u>end the deployment on an open hole</u>. Ending on a closed hole fills the cone with water and makes the Sediment Trap much heavier to recover.



Section 4.5 Orienting End Cap for Optional Tilt

The Tilt option is a separate sensor board on the Sediment Trap CF2 electronics stack. This optional feature records a time history of tilt magnitude and direction and can be used to adjust sample data during analysis. If you do not have this option installed, skip to section 4.6.

The Sediment Trap ships with the tilt calibrated. Follow these steps only if you have removed the controller housing.




Figure 4.5-1: Tilt Sensor Board



Controller housing orientation is critical if the tilt sensor is installed. Contact mclane@mclanelabs.com if you are not sure whether or not your Sediment Trap has this optional feature.



Figure 4.5-2: Correct Controller Housing Orientation with Tilt Sensor







Figure 4.5-3: Incorrect Controller Housing Orientation with Tilt Sensor

1. Confirm the Sediment Trap is level by placing a small hand level over the Sediment Trap cross channel and on the side of the cross channel (confirm that both axes are level).






Figure 4.5-4: Confirm that the Sediment Trap is Level



- 2. Loosen the u-bolts that secure the controller housing to the cross channel.
- 3. From the Main Menu select <D> Diagnostics.
- 4. Place the controller housing (with end cap oriented as shown in Figure 4.4-5) under the u-bolts but do not tighten the u-bolts.
- 5. Watch the tilt reading as the Diagnostics display scrolls forward and turn the controller housing until the tilt reading is zero.
- 6. When zero tilt is reached, tighten the u-bolts around the controller housing.




Figure 4.5-5: Secure U-Bolts Around the Controller Housing



Section 4.6 Programming Deployment Parameters

After the sample bottles are filled and attached to the rotator, the next step for a deployment is programming the Deployment Parameters.

Instrument Current Consumption

The Sediment Trap holds user-replaceable, drop-in "C" cell alkaline batteries with a total capacity of 5,000 mAh. Battery capacity for a planned deployment can be estimated using the Instrument Current Consumption tables in this section.

In these examples, the total energy consumed is less than the 5,000 mAh capacity of the battery and the proposed deployment plans will have sufficient battery life.



Create a Deployment Schedule

The Create Schedule option of the Main Menu allows users to define a deployment event schedule without entering a deployment immediately afterwards. While programming a schedule, use the file capture utility available in McLaneTerm to log all communication with the Sediment Trap.

To define a Sediment Trap deployment schedule, complete the following steps.

- 1. Power on the computer and start McLaneTerm terminal emulation.
- 2. Start a capture file.
- 3. Remove the dummy plug from the communications connector on the end cap and connect the communications cable.
- 4. Connect the communications cable to the computer serial port and connect the battery (see 'Connecting the Battery and COM Cable', in Chapter 2 of this User Manual).
- 5. Confirm the system clock is correct (McLane firmware uses a 0-24 military time convention).



6. After the firmware powers on, select Main Menu option <5> 'Create Schedule'.

Checking for Event Overlap and Schedule Verification

- After a schedule is accepted, the Sediment Trap firmware checks for potential problems, such as expired or overlapping events.
- If an overlap occurs during deployment, the start of the next event is delayed until the current event is completed (an overlap condition does not terminate the deployment).
- The system compares the time limit of each event to the scheduled start time of each subsequent event.



The warning message indicates an overlap is possible, not certain. Entering a schedule with intentionally short intervals can be a technique to secure rapid, sequential samples. The overlap message is only a reminder and can be ignored if tight scheduling is intended.

- **Headers**: Options A, B, and C of the Event Parameters allow the user to define three headers to describe the deployment.
- Sensor sampling interval: If the Sediment Trap is configured with the optional tilt sensor, the Sensor sampling interval can be changed from the default of 1 minute (this also changes the sample interval of other installed sensors such as the RBR Temp and/or Depth sensor).
 - 10. Type *v* to proceed with the deployment.

With firmware v3.12 and higher, electronics hardware changes made the backup battery unnecessary and it was elminated. If deploying a Sediment Trap that still has a backup battery, install a fresh battery <u>before every deployment</u>. The pre-deployment program confirms backup batteries are installed, and if not detected, the firmware will not accept the 'Y' entry to start the deployment.



- 11. Type *Y* to commit to the deployment (or *N* to cancel and return to the Main Menu). Prior to submerging the sampler, disconnect the communications cable from the controller housing and reconnect the dummy plug to the communications connector on the controller housing.
- 12. The Sediment Trap enters a low power sleep mode until the time of the first scheduled event. The Sediment Trap automatically wakes up and begins sampling at the scheduled time of the first event.

- 13. For a bench test, leave the communications cable attached to the Sediment Trap electronics to observe the operation of the instrument in the McLaneTerm window.
- 14. For a deployment, proceed to Chapter 5 and follow the Deployment Preparation steps to disconnect the communications cable, seal the end cap, and attach the dummy plug.



Chapter 5 Deployment and Recovery

Attaching to a Mooring

The Sediment Trap must remain upright on the mooring to collect falling sediment. The frame connects to the mooring array with three-legged, 3/16" nylon bridles. Two bridles can be used, one on the top and one on the bottom of the Sediment Trap. Or, one 3/16" bridle can be used on the top of the Sediment Trap and users can make their own chain bridles for the bottom of the Sediment Trap.




Figure 5-1: Sediment Trap Mooring Array

Deployment Preparation

After the sample bottles are installed and the rotator is positioned for deployment, deploying the Sediment Trap requires the following (in order):

- 1. Connect the battery and close the end cap (see chapter 4 for details about the end cap and battery installation).
- 2. Connect the COM cable and confirm firmware deployment settings (see chapter 4 for details about programming the deployment).
- 3. Disconnect the COM cable and attach the dummy plug.
- 4. Attach the Sediment Trap to the bridle(s), or chain.



Attaching to the Bridles and Mooring Wire

To attach the Sediment Trap to a mooring, complete the following.

- 1. Place the insulating (black) Acetel bushings into each side of the Sediment Trap's top mooring eyes.
- 2. Install a 1/2" shackle through the insulated mooring eye.
- 3. Loop another shackle through the first shackle and connect it to the 1m bridle.
- 4. Repeat Steps 1 through 3 for the rest of the mooring eyes.
- 5. Loop three shackles around the pear ring (weldless sling link) and connect it to the ends of the three 1m lengths of wire (a single pear ring should be connected to three 1m lengths of wire which are connected to the Sediment Trap).
- 6. Repeat the previous steps for the bottom mooring eyes (using 3/8" chain instead of wire).
- 7. Connect the pear-rings to the rest of the mooring system.

Recovery Procedure

After the deployment is completed, the firmware positions the alignment hole (the hole with no bottle) under the cone to seal the samples from ambient water. Post-recovery steps include the following:

- Drain the cone. If drainage is restricted by an incomplete rotation, unscrew the sample bottle that is directly under the collecting hole. All samples will be protected except for the last sample.
- Remove the sample bottles for storage.
- Offload the deployment data.
- Follow maintenance procedures to rinse and perform thorough maintenance before storage.

Removing the Sample Bottles

To remove the sample bottles, complete the following steps:

1. Confirm that the cone is drained (water in the cone should drain quickly while the Trap is lifted to the deck).



- 2. Disconnect the Sediment Trap from the mooring through the pear-ring and secure in a protected area.
- 3. Use caution when handling the disconnected bridles. Dropping bridles onto the top of the Sediment Trap cone can damage the honeycomb baffle.
- 4. Remove the sample bottles and cover securely with the screw-on lids.
- 5. Store the samples in a clean refrigerated area.
- 6. If the Sediment Trap is not being immediately redeployed, perform any necessary maintenance as described in this User Manual in Chapter 6, "Maintenance and Storage".

Offloading Data

Once the recovery steps are completed and the sample bottles are removed, data can be offloaded. This section contains instructions for running the data offload. The deployment data will display on screen and a log file can be created for use in analysis.

This procedure can be repeated. Deployment data remains in memory until a new deployment schedule is entered or the batteries are drained and/or removed.



Do not disconnect the battery (which erases the data) until checking the capture files to confirm that the data offload was successful.

- 1. Start terminal emulation on the host computer (see Chapter 2 in this User Manual for terminal emulation details).
- 2. Within McLaneTerm, specify a "Capture file" for the offloaded data.
- 3. If necessary, turn the capture On.
- 4. Connect the COM cable to the computer and then connect the COM cable to the Sediment Trap.





The computer should be on and McLaneTerm running before connecting to the Sediment Trap electronics.

5. From the Offload/Display Data File Menu, select <1> Display ALL data. The screen shown next displays.




Figure 5-2: Offload/Display Data File Menu

The screens that follow show Option <1> 'Display All Data'.

6. Press any key to offload the data and display to the screen (the data is saved to the Capture filename specified in Step 2). An example data offload file is shown next.



If the tilt option is installed, the file TILT.DAT stores the tilt time history in non volatile memory (the CF2 flashcard). In Sediment Traps with the CF2 controller, EEPROM volatile backup memory copies and displays every record from the tilt time history (TILT.DAT) on the CF2 flashcard.

Figure 5-3 and 5-4 show the offloaded data with the Tilt option installed.

- 7. After offloading the data, stop the file capture.
- 8. From the Main Menu, select <4>, Sleep, to put the system into Low power sleep mode.
- 9. Disconnect the COM cable from the Sediment Trap controller and reinstall the dummy plug.



Option <4> EEPROM Data Backup Cache

Option 4 accesses a back-up copy of critical data written to non-volatile memory during deployment. In an unlikely system malfunction, EEPROM provides limited data recovery. Make backup copies of the EEPROM capture file.

Chapter 6 Maintenance and Storage

Proper maintenance after every deployment is critical for ensuring smooth operation and long instrument life for your Sediment Trap. Reference lists are provided in this chapter for guidance on the maintenance recommendations immediately following the recovery, upon returning to a lab setting, and to prepare for long term storage.



<u>Always remove drop-in batteries</u> (and back up battery if present) from the controller housing when the sampler is not in use. Batteries left in the controller housing during shipping or storage can leak, causing damage that can void the sampler warranty.

Section 6.1 Immediately Following Recovery

Rinsing the Sediment Trap

Rinsing the cone, controller housing. motor and rotator with fresh water immediately following recovery is extremely important for long-term care of your Sediment Trap. The results of skipping this procedure can directly affect the condition and future performance of your instrument. Figure 6.1-1 shows the results of poor rinsing directly following deployment.

Several maintenance steps should be completed when the Sediment Trap returns from a deployment before longer term storage.

Check the Oil Bladder in the Drive Motor Assembly

Visually inspect the drive motor cable and housing assembly before deployment. Confirm that the compensating oil bladder has sufficient silicone oil (the oil can be topped off if necessary). To inspect the drive motor oil bladder, complete the following steps:

1. Keep the drive motor connected to the rotator assembly. Place an index finger on the oil bladder located at the bottom of the drive motor housing and press gently.






Figure 6.2-1: More Silicone Oil Needed

- 2. A properly filled bladder (as shown in Figure 6.2-2) indents approximately one inch when slight pressure is applied with the index finger on the center of the bladder.
- 3. If the bladder indents further than one inch, complete the steps listed next to top off the oil.



When inspecting the compensating oil bladder, keep clear of sharp objects.



Adding Oil to the Drive Motor (only if Necessary)

Follow the Steps Below <u>only if</u> more oil is needed to top off the oil in the compensating bladder. The bladder takes 20 CST silicone oil which you can purchase from McLane.

- 1. Unplug the drive motor cable from the controller housing.
- 2. Remove and set aside the three (3) screws and spacers that secure the drive motor to the rotator assembly.
- 3. Place the drive motor housing upright on a dry surface.
- 4. Hold the drive motor housing firmly at the bottom and side and slowly unscrew the fill plug at the top of the drive motor housing.
- 5. Insert a cone or syringe into the fill hole (as shown in Figure 6.2-3) and slowly pour in silicone oil while gently pressing up on the bladder to 'burp' out air bubbles. (The oil will be drawn into the fill hole as the air bubbles are released).

- 6. Replace and tighten the fill plug screw.
- 7. Let the drive motor sit for 24 hours.
- 8. After 24 hours release any residual air bubbles by backing off the fill plug screw just enough to loosen the o-ring seal.

9. Gently press up on the bladder until oil comes up around the fill hole screw. Tighten the screw.

10. Use an alcohol wipe to thoroughly clean the oil from around the fill plug screw.

11. Follow the steps listed next to align the rotator assembly Fixed Plate and Gear Plate holes and reattach the drive motor.

Remove and Inspect Controller Housing Internals

The controller housing should be removed and several maintenance steps can be performed once the Sediment Trap is back in a lab.




Figure 6.2-7: Controller and Drive Motor Housings

O-Rings

Inspect the o-rings. Each end of the Sediment Trap controller housing has a set of three custom manufactured o-rings in the end cap (200-0071, 200-0072, 200-0073). The Sediment Trap toolkit will include spare custom o-rings. More o-rings can be purchased from McLane. Do not substitute custom o-rings with other material




Figure 6.2-8: Sediment Trap Controller Housing Top End Cap with O-Ring Seals



O-ring maintenance and correct placement is critical to keep the controller housing end caps from water intrusion. Incorrect o-ring placement results in cracks or splits that could affect the o-ring seal and cause water damage to the controller. Water damage from incorrectly placed or maintained o-rings can void the sampler warranty.

Battery Maintenance

Using fresh Duracell batteries for each deployment is strongly recommended. Before replacing the batteries, offload all data. Disconnecting the battery erases all deployment data stored in memory.




Figure 6.2-9: Controller End Cap Attached to Battery Holder

Battery Installation

Selecting <2> Diagnostics from the Main Menu displays battery voltage. Batteries with less than 18 V should be replaced before the next deployment (battery packs below 18 V trigger a warning message and voltage below 12 V triggers a critically low battery voltage message). For details about diagnostics and battery voltage messages, see Chapter 3 in this User Manual.

When the Tilt sensor is installed, you must degausse new batteries before placing in the battery holder.

To change the batteries, complete the following steps:



Confirm that the "C" cell batteries are installed in the battery holder correctly (See Figure 6.2-11 for a detailed photo). The Sediment Trap video page at www.mclanelabs.com has a video with instructions for replacing batteries.

- 1. Place the Trap in a dry area.
- 2. Offload all deployment data before removing the main battery. All data except the non-volatile backup cache is lost when the battery is disconnected (unless the backup battery is in place).
- 3. Open the controller housing and disconnect the main battery from the electronics assembly. Move the electronics assembly end cap to a grounded electronics bench.
- 4. Remove the negative terminal screw from the bottom of the battery end cap.
- 5. Remove the remaining three screws and the battery end cap.
- 6. Remove the old batteries (if applicable) and clean the battery pack holder.
- 7. Install the new batteries, checking the marks on the terminal connectors to ensure the correct polarity (the springs in the battery holder are the negative terminal connectors).





Figure 6.2-10: Battery End Cap






Figure 6.2-11: Battery Holder Correct Battery Direction

- 8. Align the battery end cap with the negative terminal screw and replace the screws (the springs in the battery holder are the negative terminal connectors).
- 9. Work around the battery end cap slightly tightening each screw to close down the end cap. Continue around the end cap until all screws are tight.






Figure 6.2-12: Battery End Cap

- 10. Before connecting to the electronics assembly, use a volt meter to confirm correct battery connector polarity and voltage of approximately 21 volts.
- 11. Connect the battery to the electronics (see Chapter 2 "Communicating with your McLane Instrument" for steps to connect the battery.
- 12. Insert the electronics assembly into the controller housing.
- 13. Seal the controller housing.

Backup Battery

With firmware v3.12 and higher, the electronics hardware was changed making the backup battery unnecessary and it was eliminated. If your Sediment Trap still has a backup battery, install a fresh battery before every deployment. Install the backup battery correctly, as reversing polarity damages the electronics.



Closing the Controller Housing

Before sealing the controller housing, confirm the smaller o-ring and the back-up o-ring are seated in the radial grooves and position the larger o-ring (200-0071) in the face. Check to ensure there is no foreign material, cracks, grit, sand, or hair present. Clean o-rings with alcohol and lubricate with a thin coating of o-ring grease before deployment.




Figure 6.2-13: Sediment Trap O-Ring Installation - Correct Placement is Critical



When inserting the end cap into the controller housing, ensure that the face oring remains seated in its groove and that the radial o-rings enter the housing uniformly without pinching.

Remove Rotator and Rinse Ball Bearings

Aligning the Fixed and Gear Plates and Reattaching the Drive Motor

The fixed plate and gear plate holes are aligned during assembly at McLane. Realigning these plates should not be necessary unless the drive motor has been removed from the rotator assembly (for example, if the drive motor is removed so that oil can be added to the compensating bladder). To realign the plates and reattach the drive motor complete the following steps:

- 1. Align the fixed plate hole with the unthreaded gear plate alignment hole.
- 2. Visually confirm that the drive motor and Gear Plate gears correctly mesh and that the Fixed Plate hole is centered over the Gear Plate hole.
- 3. Mount the drive motor back onto the rotator assembly.
- 4. Attach the drive motor to the rotator assembly and tighten the screws.
- 5. Clean and lightly lubricate the drive motor bulkhead with Dow-Corning 55.
- 6. Plug the drive motor connector into the controller housing.

Rotator Assembly Variseals® and Bearings

Rinsing before and after each deployment keeps the rotator assembly working for many deployments and/or years. The plastic ball bearings inside the gear plate assembly and the Variseals® in the gear ring holes are durable and long-lasting.

The steps in this section can be used with consultation from McLane if it is necessary to replace Variseals[®] or ball bearings. Spare ball bearings are included in the Sediment Trap toolkit and Variseals[®] can be obtained from McLane.



Contact McLane before replacing Variseals® or ball bearings. The rotator assembly must be handled with care to prevent damage.

Replacing Varisals® and/or ball bearings is a multi-step process that consists of the following:

- Step 1 Remove Components From the Frame
- Step 2 Clean and/or Replace Variseals®
- Step 3 Clean and/or Replace Ball Bearings
- Step 4 Reassemble Rotator Plates
- Step 5 Perform a Leak Test
- Step 6 Reinstall Components Onto the Frame

Step 1 – Remove Components from the Frame

The first step for replacing Variseals® and/or ball bearings is to carefully remove the drive motor, controller housing, cone, and rotator assembly from the Trap frame.



If the tilt option is installed, removing the controller housing will require tilt realignment. See the Appendix F in this User Manual on the Tilt sensor for more detailed information.

To remove components from the frame, complete the following steps:

- 1. Remove the sample bottles from the rotator assembly and disconnect the drive motor cable from the controller housing.
- 2. Remove the three (3) bolts and three (3) spacers that hold the drive motor to the top fixed plate and carefully remove the drive motor.






Figure 6.2-14: Remove Drive Motor from Top Fixed Plate

3. Remove the two (2) u-bolts that secure the controller housing to the cross channel and carefully remove the controller housing.




Figure 6.2-15: Remove Controller Housing from the Cross Channel

4. Remove the twelve (12) bolts that hold the cone to the frame and the four (4) bolts that hold the cross channel to the frame. Place the plastic inserts that hold the bolts in a safe place so they are not lost.




Figure 6.2-17: Gear Plate Assembly Under the Top Fixed Plate

5. While lifting the cone, remove the cross channel and rotator assembly. Keep the cross channel attached to the rotator assembly top fixed plate. Lower the cone back onto the frame and secure in a clean area.

6. Remove the seven (7) bolts (without the plastic washers) that secure the gear plate assembly to the top fixed plate and gently remove the gear plate assembly. The gear plate assembly will be visible on the underside of the top fixed plate. The Variseals® will be visible on the underside of the gear plate assembly once it is removed from the top fixed plate.



The four retaining bolts (with plastic inserts) keep the bottom fixed plate in place and hold the plastic ball bearings. Keep these bolts attached or the ball bearings will fall out.

Step 2 - Clean and Replace Variseals®

To clean and replace the Variseals® in the gear plate assembly, complete the following steps:

1. Lay the gear plate assembly with Variseals® facing up on a clean, flat surface.

- 2. Remove Variseals® from the gear ring grooves (using fingers or a plastic tool to avoid scratching the seals).
- 3. Clean the grooves with alcohol and a lint free wipe.
- 4. Thoroughly rinse and dry each Variseal®.
- 5. Inspect Variseals® for signs of wear and the presence of any foreign material (such as hair or grit) that could affect the seal.
- 6. <u>Do not grease</u> or lubricate the gear ring, bottom fixed plate, or seals.
- 7. Place Variseals® back in the gear ring grooves, replacing with new seals as needed.






Figure 6.2-19: Installing Variseal® Thin Side Down



One Variseal® edge is thinner than the other. To obtain the correct seal, the Variseal® must be placed in the gear ring groove with the thin side down.

8. If also replacing bearings, continue to the next section: Step 3 – Clean and Replace Ball Bearings." Otherwise, continue to Step 4.

Complete the steps in this section to clean and replace ball bearings.

- 1. If not already done, the gear plate assembly should be removed from the top fixed plate (see Figure 6-2.17).
- 2. Place the gear plate assembly with Variseals® facing up on a clean, flat surface and remove the bottom fixed plate.



3. Remove the four (4) retaining bolts (with plastic washers) that secure the bottom fixed plate to the gear ring and remove the bottom fixed plate.

- 4. Remove the bearings and rinse and dry thoroughly to remove salt or other foreign matter.
- 5. Clean the bearing groove with alcohol and a lint free wipe.
- 6. Inspect bearings and confirm that there are no chips or other damage. Damaged bearings should be replaced with spares from the Toolkit.
- 7. Fill the bearing groove with bearings. The bearing groove for the 21 cup Sediment Trap holds approximately 99 bearings (approximately 78 bearings for the 13 cup Trap). A fast method for filling the groove in either size Trap is to add bearings until no more will fit and then remove four (4) bearings.
- 8. Reinstall the bottom fixed plate and tighten the 4 retaining bolts.
- 9. Tighten the 7 securing bolts only until the lock washers become flat.
- 10. Proceed to Step 4 shown next, Reassemble Rotator Assembly.

Step 4 – Reassemble Rotator Assembly

- 1. Rinse the top fixed plate and gear plate assembly with fresh water. <u>Do not</u> clean the plates with an abrasive cleaner. The surface of the top fixed plate must remain smooth to correctly seal.
- 2. Reattach the gear plate assembly to the top fixed plate by aligning the center holes and tightening the bolts (position the bolts in the threaded holes and tighten only until the lock washer is flat).
- 3. Manually rotate the gear plate assembly so that the unthreaded alignment hole matches up with the hole in the top fixed plate.

Step 5 – Perform a Leak Test

After parts are replaced and the rotator is reassembled, a leak test should be performed to ensure that the rotator assembly is properly sealed. To perform a leak test, complete the steps shown next.

- 1. Confirm that the rotator assembly fill plug is in place before beginning the leak test.
- 2. Place the rotator assembly in a sink or wet area.




Figure 6.2-21: Fill Plug on Rotator Assembly




Figure 6.2-22: Performing Leak Test

3. Pour neutral water into each Gear Plate hole as shown in Figure 6.2-22.

4. Let the rotator assembly sit for approximately one hour. A quickly leaking hole can indicate a reassembly problem, for example, a Variseal® that is installed with the thin lip facing incorrectly. If leakage occurs, separate the Top and Bottom Fixed Plates, recheck seals, reassembly the rotator assembly, and repeat the leak test.

Reinstall Components onto the Frame

After the leak test confirms that the rotator assembly is sealed, the drive motor, rotator assembly and controller housing must be reattached to the frame. To reinstall components onto the frame, complete the following steps:

- 1. On the rotator assembly, confirm that the drive motor gear meshes with the gear plate assembly and that the hole in the top fixed plate matches up with the unthreaded alignment hole in the gear ring. Do not overtighten the screws.
- 2. Reattach the cone to the frame by lifting the cone up about ten (10) inches and placing the rotator assembly onto the resting brackets of the Trap frame. Lower the cone, making sure the cone is aligned with the cone adapter (the plastic insert should go in from the bottom of the frame).

3. Secure the cone to the Trap frame with the twelve (12) sets of nuts and bolts. When attaching the cone, confirm that the plastic inserts are correctly placed in the holes on the frame.



The mounting holes in the cone are not spaced symmetrically. The cone lip and the frame were marked with black ink prior to shipment to help align the bolt holes during re-assembly.

- 4. Secure the four (4) sets of nuts and bolts to reattach the cross channel to the frame.
- 5. Carefully re-install the drive motor by reattaching the three (3) bolts and three (3) spacers that hold the drive motor to the rotator assembly top fixed plate.
- 6. Carefully reattach the controller housing to the cross channel by re-securing the two (2) u-bolts.
- 7. Re-check gear ring alignment prior to deployment.



Storage

Cover Top/Honeycomb Baffle with Clean Plastic for Storage

Cover the top honeycomb baffle with clean plastic for storage.

The shipping crate is a reusable international freight container that is ISPM-15 compliant for international transport.



To prevent instument damage during transport or storage, avoid excessive vibration and extreme temperatures for prolonged periods of time.

• Cover the top of the Sediment Trap with clean plastic and store in a protected area away from extreme heat. Cold temperatures do not affect the Sediment Trap while in storage (the instrument has been tested to -2° C).



Appendix A Wet Sample Particle Divider

The Wet Sample Particle Divider (WSD-10) divides wet particulate samples for bio-geochemical analysis into five or ten equal parts. Dividing wet particulate samples provides more pure samples than drying samples to obtain the particulate.




Figure A-1: WSD-10 Wet Sample Divider

The WSD-10 includes a rotary sample splitter head, tower, and sample tray with a 500 ml capacity. Dials set the movement speed for the rotary splitter and tower. A quantity of 100 glass vials and 5 plastic sample cups are provided with a new WSD-10.

Setting Up the Wet Sample Divider

To prevent damage, the Wet Sample Divider is shipped with the sample tray uninstalled. To install the tray, complete the following steps:

- 1. Wash the sample tray and rotary head with neutral water.
- 2. Plug the Wet Sample Divider into an AC power outlet.
- 3. Turn the Tower switch 'On' and Press the 'Up' button (the Tower must be all the way up before the sample tray can be installed).
- 4. Slide the sample tray into the grooved notch at the top of the Tower.

5. Slide the front of the tray down over the Rotary Splitter Head.






Figure A-4: Installing Sample Tray Front

Using the Wet Sample Divider

To use the Wet Sample Divider, complete the following steps:

- 1. Set the rotary head speed dial to 10 (1 revolution per second).
- 2. Set the tower speed dial to 4 (5 cm per second).
- 3. Place sample cups under the rotary head.
- 4. Confirm that tower is completely in the 'Down' position.
- 5. Turn the rotary head switch 'On'.
- 6. Slowly pour the wet sample into the tray.
- 7. Press the tower switch 'On'.
- 8. When the sample begins to drain from the tray, use a squirt bottle to pour a constant stream of neutral water into the tray and move the sample down into the sample bottles.
- 9. After the tower stops in the upward position, rinse the sides of the tray with water from the squirt bottle.
- 10. Press the rotary head switch 'Off' and Remove the sample tray.
- 11. Rinse the side walls of the rotary head.

Appendix B Optional RBR Temperature and Depth Sensors

Sediment Traps with optional RBR sensors record temperature and depth data. Sediment Traps manufactured at an earlier date used older style pressure and temperature loggers (McLane retired these sensors in 2015). For information about using the older style pressure and temperature loggers, refer to the archived Sediment Trap User Manual at mclanelabs.com or contact mclane@mclanelabs.com.

The RBR temperature and depth sensors are available in several models. A dual channel model logs both temperature and depth (pressure) readings, or single channel models collect either temperature or pressure readings. These RBR sensors are integrated with the Sediment Trap firmware. RBR data logging and power are provided by the Sediment Trap.




Figure B-1: Trap with RBR Temperature/Depth Sensor

Installing RBR Sensor onto Sediment Trap Frame

Follow these steps if RBR sensor installation is needed (the sensor is typically installed).

1. Locate the 7/64 hex driver provided in the Sediment Trap tool kit.




Figure B-4: Using hex driver, tighten mounting screws








Figure B-6: Remove protective cover







Figure B-7: Apply Molykote to RBR cable





Figure B-8: Connect RBR sensor cable to sensor and tighten locking sleeve




Figure B-10: Sediment Trap Main Menu Configuration String with Temperature and Depth

RBR temperature and/or depth data is logged to the DATA.DAT file on the system compact flash drive. If a single or dual channel RBR logger is installed, the following also applies:

- The Diagnostics display shows external temperature (Celsius) and/or pressure (dbar).
- Data offload also contains external temperature and/or pressure.
- If using the Pressure option, an atmospheric pressure option on the Configuration Menu allows you to automatically or manually change the atmospheric pressure.
- Default for recording temperature and or depth readings is 1 minute. This default can be changed on the Deployment menu.

Connecting Directly with RBR Sensors

Typing *R* at the Manu Menu displays the RBR Sensor Menu. Option 1 allows direct communication with the RBR sensor. Settings should <u>not</u> be changed without consulting McLane or RBR. This option requires a password. Contact <u>mclane@mclanelabs.com</u> for more detailed information.

Configuration Menu - Atmospheric Pressure Offset

The menu option <P> displays for RBR loggers that will record depth. Selecting this option allows you to zero the atmospheric pressure either automatically or manually. This sets the current ambient pressure on the RBR logger to zero scale at the surface so that the logger reading reflects the pressure from below the surface.

Appendix C Adaptive Sampling Firmware

Adaptive sampling firmware provides the user with command-line control over the Sediment Trap. By issuing commands from a provided command set, the user has full control over the system after the Sediment Trap has been deployed.



The Adaptive Sampling option requires a continuous RS-232 connection from the Sediment Trap to a computer or other microcontroller.

An Adaptive Deployment is pre-programmed to perform the same functions as a standard (time-series) deployment, except that a serial command sent to the controller triggers each sample collection. In standard deployment mode, a date and time trigger sample collection.

Using Interactive Sampling Commands

Once deployed, the Sediment Trap sample events can be changed via the communication protocol. Communicating with the Sediment Trap during deployment allows the operator to adapt the sampling schedule in real-time. To use the interactive commands, complete the following steps:

- 1. Begin terminal emulation and confirm that the firmware is in low power sleep. The 'ML' in the prompt indicates 'McLane Labs', followed by the sampler serial number. The serial number is a unique identifier for each sampler.
- 2. Press any key to display a prompt (available only when the firmware is in low power sleep during the deployment).



3. Type an interactive command to communicate with the firmware (15 seconds of typing inactivity deactivates the prompt, pressing any key reactivates the prompt). After executing an interactive command, the system returns to low power sleep to wait for the next sample event or the next interactive command.



ST - Current Status

The 'ST' command displays Event #, confirms rotator alignment, shows electronics temperature in °C, battery voltage, previous sample date/time, current date/time, next sample date/time (shown in Figure C-2).



RB - Rotate Bottle

'RB' Rotate Bottle commands the firmware to rotate to the next bottle. There is a 5 minute delay between the command and the rotation to allow the user to make corrections. As shown in Figure C-3, no other events are changed. A status line is returned to show the change.




Figure C-7: 'CE # Date/Time' Change Event Number Scheduled Start




Figure C-8: 'DM' Display Menu




Figure C-10: <5> Change Schedule (screen 1 of 2)

Offload Data <7> can be used at any point during the deployment to display data for completed samples. Re-run option <7> at the end of the deployment to see data for all samples.




Figure C-14: <7> Offload Deployment Data (screen 1 of 2)

To redeploy the Sediment Trap, the electronics must be reset and/or the power cycled by disconnecting the battery pack.

Appendix D Optional Ethernet Communication

Ethernet communication in an available option that can be used with adaptive sampling instead of an RS-232 connection. This Appendix explains the Ethernet hardware, Ethernet configuration and communication.

Ethernet Hardware

A PERLE Ethernet to serial board (IOLAN-TS2) is added to the standard electronics for Ethernet communication. An external, 24V power source and connection to an Ethernet network are required to communicate with the Sediment Trap. If the external power is removed, the Ethernet board power will turn off and the RS232 communications will turn on. The electronics will continue to operate on the internal batteries.



End Cap Connectors, Test Cable and Current Draw

The Ethernet/External Power bulkhead connector on the controller housing is a 6 pin MCBH(WB)-6-MP-Ti connector that mates to an Impulse MCIL-6-FS cable connector. A test cable (included for bench testing - do not use for deployment) has the cable connector, an RJ45 Ethernet connector and a dual, in-line banana jack as shown in Figure D-2. Figure D-3 shows the test cable wiring diagram. The external power source must be 24V DC, capable of 750mA (minimum) (not to exceed 30VDC). Current draw is 70 mA (motor off) and 350 mA (motor on).




Figure D-1: Endcap with Ethernet Bulkhead Connector







Figure D-2: Test Cable Connectors

Ethernet Configuration

The Ethernet board can be configured using the PERLE software on the CD-ROM included with the Sediment Trap. The factory settings are shown in the Web Browser Interface (Figure D-4).




Figure D-4: Web Interface to Ethernet Board

Ethernet Communication

Once configured, the Ethernet board will accept raw TCP/IP commands and pass them to the Sediment Trap firmware. The TCP/IP communication module would include the following components:

- 1. Establish the TCP/IP connection with the controller IP Address and port (10001).
- 2. Send commands using a TCP Transmit command.
- 3. Receive data using a TCP Read command.
- 4. Disconnect using a TCP Close command.

Matlab, LabVIEW, and many C compilers include raw TCP/IP example code.

There are two COM ports on the Ethernet board. COM Port 1 is used for communication (Ethernet Port 10001), COM Port 2 (Ethernet Port 10002) is used to reboot the electronics if emergency recovery is required. Connecting to Ethernet Port 10002, automatically reboots the electronics.



Appendix E Deep Sediment Trap Connectors

Sediment Traps deployed at depths from 7,000m to 10,000m, require high pressure penetrators on the controller COM port and motor connector. These high pressure penetrators have a locking collar with an inner locking ring.

To remove the motor from the Sediment Trap, the motor connector must fit through a hole in the rotator. First, the red locking collar and inner locking ring must be removed.






Figure E-1: High Pressure Penetrators with Locking Collar and Inner Locking Ring

Removing Penetrator Locking Collar and Locking Ring

Before removing the motor from the Sediment Trap, you must complete the following steps to remove the high pressure penetrator locking collar and locking ring.



Remove the locking collar and locking rinrg only if you are removing the motor from the Sediment Trap.

1. Unscrew the locking collar from the Sediment Trap controller housing and unplug the motor bulkhead and slide the red locking collar onto the motor cable.




Figure E-3: Lift to Release Tab of Silver Locking Ring

- 2. Using a screwdriver or other flat tool such as pliers, lift the silver locking ring by the groove and pull up onto top of locking collar. Continue pulling locking ring until the ring releases from groove inside the locking collar.
- 3. Remove the red locking collar from the motor cable.
- 4. Twist the locking ring off of the motor cable to remove.

5. Remove the motor cable by fitting the motor cable through the hole in the rotator.

Re-attaching Penetrator Locking Collar and Locking Ring

Complete the following steps to re-attach the locking collar, locking ring and reconnect the motor cable.

- 1. Slide the motor cable up through the rotator plate.
- 2. Twist the locking ring sideways onto the motor cable and slide the locking collar back onto motor cable. Face the grooves in the locking collar towards the bulkhead connector.






Figure E-6: Twist Silver Locking Ring onto Motor Cable and Slide Red Collar onto Cable

3. Turn the locking ring to the side to fit into the groove inside the locking collar.

4. With thumb secured on bottom of red collar, push forward towards bulkhead. This motion should push the locking ring inside the groove. The locking ring is secure when you hear it snap into place with a 'click'.





COM Cable Wiring

The cable connecting the controller to the computer must be wired correctly for proper communications. A wiring diagram for the COM cable is included below. The M3854 cable converts the MCBH to IL-5.




Figure E-9: COM Connector Diagram
